How an epidemic may spur us towards healthy reforms

Concern about what additional burdens the spread of Covid19 might put on hospitals in Australia will further aggravate existing pressures on the health system.

There are already reports of over-worked emergency departments and long waiting lists to see specialists and for admissions for elective surgery in public hospitals, even in affluent places like Canberra.

The pressure on public health services is symptomatic of risks to the sustainability of our health system nationally and particularly on elderly and low-income Australians.

The vision of hospitals struggling to meet a potentially large and different challenge posed by Covid19 is already prompting consideration of changes to meet the hazards of widespread contagious disease.

Such measures might include reforms that have been long-suggested, including Medicare-financed telehealth for GPs. If patients could consult their GPs by telephone, skype or other video means that would reduce the need for unnecessary visits by patients. And wider government use of available beds in private hospitals for elective surgery could also lighten the heavy load on public wards.

We must hope that the optimism expressed by authorities that Australia is well-placed to meet a potential "surge" of cases triggered by Covid19.

That may be so. The fact is that too often there are pain points in the system that mean people are not taking up referrals for treatment because of high gap fees, that many people who have private treatment then face excessive out of pocket costs.

The result is that the impact of poor access to specialists is that people are getting sicker and their illness more chronic and when they finally get to hospital they are often more expensive to treat.

Coronavirus

The chance of coming into contact with coronavirus (Covid-2019) has increased with many more countries reporting cases, including Australia. Media outlets and social media channels are awash with news, opinions and wrong information.

CHF reinforces the message from the Chief Medical Officer and the Department of Health that people should follow the most recent information posted daily on the Department's website and from the <u>World Health Organisation</u>.

The Department of Health has a dedicated page with resources for health professionals, and the Victorian-based **Health Translations** has some resources and factsheets translated into simplified chinese and a few other common languages spoken by migrants in Australia.

Most Common compliants against five health professions revealed

The most common complaints against five different health professions has been revealed in a comprehensive study by a team led by Professor Merrilyn Walton from the University of Sydney.

The team examined over 12,600 complaints made over an 18 month period in the following disciplines:

- Medicine
- Dentistry
- · Nursing and midwifery
- Pharmacy
- Psychology

Complaints were most often against doctors and dentists and least common for nurses and midwives. This is the first analysis of this type which spans across these five practices. The most common cause of complaint was about clinical care (44% of all complaints), medication (10%) and health impairment of the practitioner (8%).

Male practitioners were at least twice as likely as female practitioners to have a complaint made against them.

The details of this research is available the February issue of *Australian Health Review* (AHR), the professional journal of the **Australian Healthcare and Hospitals Association.**

NPS MedicineWise has launched a new program on paediatric asthma which focuses on the diagnosis and treatment of the condition.


Recent discussions in the media about treatment options has highlighted the complexity of managing asthma.

The campaign includes resources to help consumers to know what kinds of questions to ask before going ahead with a cosmetic procedure. **Be safe first** encourages consumers to think seriously about who is undertaking the procedure, where it is performed, and the product being used before going through with any cosmetic procedure.

The 'be safe first' resources include a new 'cosmetic surgery and procedures' section on the Ahpra website with dedicated pages for specific audiences.

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2020 NIP influenza vaccination program: Advice from the Chief Medical Officer

The annual vaccination is the most important measure to prevent influenza and its complications and is recommended for all people aged 6 months and over (unless contraindicated).

To meet the anticipated demand for seasonal influenza vaccines in 2020, the Australian Government will be securing the largest supply of seasonal influenza vaccines ever through the National Immunisation Program (NIP) for people most at risk. NIP vaccines will be available in April, subject to local supply arrangements.





Social Prescribing Roundtable - Report

Social prescribing is the practice where health professionals, including GPs, have the resources and infrastructure to link patients with social services – in a bid to address the social determinants contributing to poor health and stave off the epidemic of loneliness and social isolation.
