Diving deep into high level strategy to help consumers get the best from their healthcare

This week sees submissions close on two major fronts: the Review of the National Medicines Policy (NMP) and the future strategic directions for the Medical Research Future Fund (MRFF).

Designing policy for the good health of Australians is not for the feint hearted and you'd have to say it suits policy wonks, but the involvement of consumers in this work is vital to a sustainable and fair health system in Australia that we can all be proud of.

Nothing can be more important to illness treatment, management and recovery as access to affordable, evidence-based medicines. In the 1980s and 90s CHF led the advocacy for an NMP. It has guided the use of medicines since 1990 when it was developed by the Australian Pharmaceutical Council, and aims to improve health outcomes for all Australians through their access to, and the wise use of medicines.

The Review sets out to examine how the pharmaceutical and prescribing landscape has changed in the intervening years, and whether the Policy meets the demands of its intended purpose; to provide timely access for Australians to affordable medicines.

It is pitched as a high-level activity to reaffirm or refresh the objectives and principles.

Stakeholders have been invited to discuss how the Policy will adapt to innovation and how the role of consumers can be strengthened and supported. Other considerations are whether the scope of the Policy should be expanded to include health technologies, how relationships with partners are managed, and how to include evaluation steps into the Policy.

In our submission, CHF will stress the need to strengthen diverse consumer involvement in the Policy, particularly its governance and oversight. We will call for strengthened health literacy principles; an implementation, monitoring and accountability framework which includes an annual forum resulting in regular review report cards to measure impact; and the need to strengthen principles around investing in researchers and research.

Next steps are the publication of the Draft Review and a stakeholder forum to review the work. We will continue to keep you included with <u>updates to this information</u> <u>webpage</u>.

Further afield, CHF attended a by-invitation Roundtable where the focus was on priorities for medical research. The MRFF is the dominant source of funding for medical and health research in Australia. Its priorities are determined by the Australian Medical Research Advisory Board which initiated the consultation. The Priorities take into account the burden of disease in Australia and how to deliver practical benefits from the available allocated funding.

In our submission for the MRFF 2021- 2026 strategy and priorities, CHF is focusing on advocating for embedding social contexts (such as social determinants) and environmental contexts into the areas where the MRFF identifies missions, sets priorities and approves funding. We are explaining how Consumer and Community Engagement (CCE) must be meaningfully embedded in all aspects of the strategy and guide the MRFF into a more fully inclusive consumer consultative process. We are also calling for the scope of relevant costs to explicitly cover the full cost of research, including indirect costs.

Aside from identifying targeted research topics and securing funding for projects, researchers also struggle to make connections with enough people to participate in clinical trials. It's not that Australians don't want to contribute to vital medical research, the problem lies in connecting researchers to a pool of suitable participants. Without the valuable input of patients and healthy participants, projects can fail to complete the requirements. 
How communities help bring vaccinations to the bush


What is Australia's Health Panel?
