Updates from YHF Members

CHF's Board in 2020 - Roxxanne MacDonald, QLD

As well as being a member of the YHF, I also joined CHF's board in August last year, so I want to say hi and give a little look at what it's been like.

First, a quick summary of what a board is:

Every board is a bit different. CHF's board has 9 members and we meet five times a year. Essentially, a board makes sure the organisation is working towards its purpose. They oversee things like compliance and risk, planning and strategy, and finances.

Joining the board has been a steep learning curve, but also really rewarding. A lot has been happening in this big and complex sector including the Productivity Commission Inquiry into Mental Health, a Royal Commission into Aged Care, and lots of government strategies and reforms. I'm still improving my knowledge of all the health sector acronyms!

I've gotten to know the initiatives CHF is advocating for like social prescribing (which you can read more about here). The board is also an advocate for issues particularly important to young people, like raising Youth Allowance and Newstart, and the health impacts of Climate Change.

All of us know having young people at the table is important, especially for youthfocused issues, young people's issues, but as a board member I learn and contribute to everything from primary health, the federal budget and even aged care.

I'm really looking forward to an exciting year for CHF and the YHF as well as the CHF Summit 2020: Shifting Gears later this year. I'm excited to see young leaders, particularly the YHF, showcase the work they've been doing and demonstrate why young consumers are so valuable.

Social Prescribing Round Table - Georgia Gardner, VIC

Have you heard of Social Prescribing? Social Prescribing is a mechanism for health professionals to refer consumers to non-health services and supports. For example, prescribing that a patient with a rare chronic disease connect with a peer-based support charity for the condition, or prescribing a patient with symptoms of loneliness and low rates of physical activity connect with their local Park Run organization. Social Prescribing is grounded in the social determinants of health, and patient-centred care.

On Monday, November 25th a roundtable on Social Prescribing was held in Melbourne. The event was co-hosted by CHF and the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP) in partnership with the National Health and Medical Research Council Partnership Centre on Health System Sustainability. The roundtable aimed to explore whether social prescribing should play a role in our model of healthcare, and what essential approaches are required to meet consumer needs.

The event was attended by a range of stakeholders, including GP's, allied health professionals, peak body representatives and consumers. In general, the support for developing an imbedded model of Social Prescribing in primary and allied healthcare was strong. A key highlight was a presentation and Q&A session with several practitioners already running pilot or trial programs for different models of Social Prescribing, which demonstrated many of the potential benefits, and also the level of administrative care needed, in running this type of program.

Social Prescribing practices are already in place in several health systems internationally. Systematic reviews of Social Prescribing literature have been optimistic, but highlight a need for wider scale testing and analysis to determine the impacts and best practice for the Australian system.

Primary Health Network Planning Day - Brooke Simpson, ACT

The Primary Health Network planning day took place in Adelaide on 19th of December 2019, the roundtable was extremely informative and an excellent chance for consumers to have an influence over key policy areas which are undergoing major change in the coming years. Representatives from various peak bodies in rural and remote health care were present along with the President of the AMA - Tony Burton, CEO of CHF Leanne Wells and Professor Paul Worley - National Rural Health Commissioner.

The roundtable provided opportunity for discussion and suggestions for improving prevention, primary health care and health workforce for people living in rural and remote areas. Department of Health representatives Simon Cotterell and Sharon Appleyard comprehensively summarised the discussion to utilise it to better inform primary healthcare network reforms.

Launch of the WH&Y Commission

The WH&Y Commission was set up in 2019 following extensive consultation with young people. The intent of this commission is to ensure young people are systematically involved by organisations, researchers and policymakers when they set agendas, create projects and run consultations in their work on adolescent health.
